He asked parliament to stop in and it was banned in 1807. So he definitely did end slavery. berforce, Clarkson, Petition, Slavery.	Thomas Clarkson also helped end slavery. He held many meetings and persuaded people to sign petitions. He worked alongside Wilberforce and actually took his argument further by asking that slavery be abolished altogether, not just the slave trade.	Wilberforce was certainly important in ending the slave trade in 1807 but he was not actively campaigning to end the abolition of slavery. It could be argued that Wilberforce relied on the work of other men such as Equiano who wrote his autobiography and helped the people of Britain understand the brutality of slavery and Clarkson who did the hard grind of attending local meetings and getting popular support. In my opinion it is incorrect to say Wilberforce 'ended' the slave trade, instead we should say he made 'an important contribution'. I would argue
