Exam Rubric - Practical Suggestions to Support Year 11 Revision

Over the course of the year, staff in all departments have been working hard to produce an exam rubric for each of their subjects in order to further support GCSE students in their study and revision. A rubric is, simply, a document which <u>makes explicit the criteria by which students' assessments are marked</u>. At Millthorpe, we recognise the value of exam rubric in supporting each student to understand <u>how</u> to make progress to be the best that they can be in each subject and to achieve the best possible final outcomes.


Each department's rubric contains information across the following four areas:

- <u>Description</u> Task/Assignment/Exam Overviews for Each Paper, Grade Boundaries.
- <u>Criteria</u> Assessment Objectives, Mark Schemes, Inserts/Formula Grids, Knowledge Organisers, 'Top Tips'.
- <u>Levels</u> Explicit Success Criteria for Each Level or Grade Point.
- <u>Standards</u> Model examples of Answers at Each Grade Point, including 100% Answers, with Clear Rationale, Key Points from Examiner Reports.

Rubrics have been launched to Year 11 students in lessons, through an assembly and a PD lesson in which students were able to explore their content. There is also a dedicated Year 11 Exam Rubric Google Classroom on which students can find all of their exam rubrics for each subject in one place.

As the final revision season gets underway for Year 11, please do encourage your child to make the most effective use of their exam rubrics and to put the information they contain at the heart of their revision - published revision guides are great, but our rubrics have been written by *our* staff specifically for the students they teach, meaning that every page is relevant to them and contains vital information to help move *our* students forward in their understanding in the ways we know will work best for them.
